#### We say together the Lord's Prayer

#### All Age Talk

What does 'home' mean to you? Turn to someone near you and have a chat about what words come to your mind as you think about the word home.

Do you feel welcome there? Is home a welcoming place to you?

It can be really unpleasant to feel unwelcome in a place or situation. To feel like you don't belong. To feel like others in the room are unhappy that you are there or judging you for how you look, how you are dressed, how under-prepared you were for this experience.

What sort of things make you feel welcome? In your home? At your church? Turn to someone else and share some of those things with someone near you.

After you've done that – share some of them with the rest of the congregation – just shout out a word or two!

What things can you do to extend a welcome to people who don't normally come to be a part of our church? How can you be a welcoming person, even when you don't meet people face-to-face (for example, on the phone, or when you talk to your friends)?

Jesus was always working to make sure we understand that everyone is welcome – no matter where they are from, what they have done, or what their background is. Jesus tests and challenges us to be more welcoming, more inclusive.

Is that something you can do this week?

How do you need to be more welcoming?

#### Reflections on the readings

Greetings, beloved community!

Today, we embark on a journey through scripture that highlights an important truth for us as Christians in this place, in 2024: our strength is made perfect in weakness.

We'll explore two passages from the Bible – Mark 1-13 and 2 Corinthians 12:2-10 – to discover how our vulnerabilities are not just challenges to overcome but are opportunities for divine grace to shine through.

Part 1: The Humble Beginnings

In the Gospel of Mark, we see Jesus beginning his public ministry. From his baptism to facing temptations in the wilderness, and calling his first disciples, these stories lay a foundation of humility and service. Jesus didn't start his work in grandeur but in the simplicity and struggles of human life.

Let's do a quick poll.

How many of you have felt, at some point in your life, that you were not ready or equipped for a task or calling? Raise your hand / give me a wave! [Pause for response]

Yes, it looks like many of us have felt this way!

Part 2: Embracing Our Weaknesses

Moving to Paul's letter to the Corinthians, we find him grappling with a "thorn in the flesh." Despite pleading for relief, God's response was, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Paul then chooses to boast about his weaknesses, that Christ's power may rest on him.

Think for a moment about a personal weakness or struggle that continually challenges you. Now, imagine what it would look like if God's power was made perfect through this very weakness.

Share a word or phrase that comes to mind with someone next to you. [Pause for sharing. Take one or two suggestions if you'd like.]

Part 3: The Power of Divine Strength

Both Jesus and Paul teach us that divine strength doesn't look like human strength. It's not about overpowering or overwhelming; it's about surrendering and finding God's presence in our most vulnerable moments.

Let's do a thought experiment.

If your weaknesses were suddenly transformed into strengths, how would that change your approach to challenges, relationships, or ministry? Discuss briefly with a neighbour. [Pause for discussion]

Conclusion: A Call to Authenticity.

As we reflect on these scriptures today, let's embrace our full humanity – our strengths and our weaknesses. Our vulnerabilities aren't just obstacles; they are the very places where God's grace can most profoundly work.

So, this week, I encourage you to:

- 1. Identify a weakness and consider how it might be used for a greater good.
- 2. Offer that weakness up in prayer, asking God to fill you with strength.
- 3. Look for opportunities to support others in their weaknesses, knowing that we are all in this together.

In closing, let's say together, "In our weakness, we are strong." Repeat after me, "In our weakness, we are strong."

Thank you for sharing this time together. May you go forth this week, empowered by the perfect strength found in our perfect weakness.
