Hush the Noise

Each year, the Methodist Church produces resources to enable Churches to explore new ways of planning worship and evangelism during Advent and Christmastime.

This year, the theme given is 'Hush the Noise', which is taken from the carol 'It Came Upon the Midnight Clear':

But with the woes of sin and strife
The world has suffered long;
Beneath the angel-strain have rolled
Two thousand years of wrong;
And man, at war with man, hears not
The love-song which they bring;Oh hush the noise, ye men of strife,
And hear the angels sing.

I was recently asked to be part of a recorded conversation on this theme, and all those invited were given the chance to respond to the question 'which noise(s) are you hoping to hush this Christmas?'

As you know, I'm not usually short of words (!) but preparing my response to this question took several attempts but I couldn't quite put my finger on why.

It's easy, I think, to say I'd like to hush the noise of consumerism, but I think that seems judgmental, and I've always maintained that if people are celebrating Christmas, in whatever way, I'm quite happy about that.

It would also be easy to say that I'd like to hush the noise of busy-ness this holy season, but that's not quite right either, because I think the busy-ness in my diary this season is so closely linked to the people of God wanting to celebrate and share the good news of Jesus' birth that I don't want to get rid of that either.

In the end, I realized that the 'noise' that I'm feeling most bothered by this year is the 'noise' of despair. I think there are many thinks to feel despairing about – each time I pop the evening news on, or whenever the BBC news app flashes up on my phone, it feels like there's another terrible thing to be so upset and worried about.

And I don't want to hush the noise of the news from around our communities and world which causes distress, because I don't want to ignore it. But I do want to make sure that I try to hear, and enable others to hear, the angels sing. Not literally, though that would be lovely! What I mean is that, through all the awful news that comes to us, we must try to remember that the angels' song was one of peace – that peace can come to the world because of Jesus.

We are part of this angel song, the proclamation of peace, and the building of peace. If we love and follow Jesus, we must be actively seeking to bring peace to our world.

To do this, I think we have to be realistic about the brokenness of the world, but not overwhelmed by despair. It's not easy, I know.

But we are people called to witness to the hope of a better world, possible and close by, if only all would follow the ways Jesus has carved for us.

So I'm not sure if I've yet got my head straight about exactly which noises we should hush this Advent time, but I think a song of joy and hope and peace may just put the din of despair in its place. That is my prayer as we enter December this year. **Rev Becki**



A Message from our Senior Steward

As the cold weather approaches, I would like to tell you about a plan we are considering. We have applied for a grant from the Methodist District and from Leeds Council, to enable us to offer a 'warm space' to anyone who needs it over the next 3/4 months. This already happens at our current coffee mornings and repair café, where if anyone comes in for refreshments and warmth, they are welcome, irrespective of who they are and whether or not they can pay.

The amount of the grant is not yet certain, but it is considerable. This year we are hoping to expand our service to a Tuesday morning, where anyone will be welcome to come in and have tea, coffee, soup and bread in a warm place with an opportunity to be signposted to agencies that can offer advice if it is required.

This Tuesday session will be a simple affair with a table set with things to make drinks, and chairs but primarily it will be warm and welcoming and will be advertised as a 'warm welcoming space'. We will operate a 'pay as you can' system. There may be folk who just want to get out of the house and so save on their heating bill for the morning, homeless people, or people who want company, or passing footfall who just want light refreshments.

I think the number of volunteers we will need to run this new session will be minimal, but if you are able to help, for an hour or two on any Tuesday morning over the next 3 months, please let me know. Thank you, *Barbara Lloyd*.

<u>Leeds South & East Foodbank (Trussell Trust)</u> helping local people in crisis

Memories of Michael Teal

From the Eulogy: 'At the age of about 3, father was taken to the Sunday school beginner's department of this church, Cross Gates Methodist. He continued to attend, with only a short break, throughout his childhood becoming a full member of the Methodist Church on the 27th of January 1957.

He attended for the rest of his life and served on the church council for decades, as a church steward, on the property committee and a long-standing member of the "men's fellowship". His strong Christian faith was an important part of his life.

Michael was, to me, the Envelope Man. Every year an array of envelopes appeared on the tables in the corridor carefully set out by Michael (with, I suspect, help from Mary). Little did I appreciate the time and effort put into getting them all ready. In June 2019, after 25 years of being Stewardship Recorder, Michael expressed his wish at Church Council to step down. As I had finished working by then I offered to take over and in February 2020 Michael invited me to his house to show me the ropes and be there for me for the first year. Part of the handover included giving me the ledgers which recorded people's offertory giving over the years. It was fascinating to see names I had forgotten from my early days attending Church and also sad to see, as people passed away, a line going through their name. Now Michael joins those who have gone before as I, with a heavy heart, draw a line though his name in the same ledger he kept for 25 years. He leaves a hole in many of our lives. *Amanda Brow*

Although I only knew Michael for a relative short time compared to many of the Church Family, he welcomed us to the church and often gave Georgina and I lifts home from Church. He also gave me lifts to the Mens Fellowship when meetings were held on a Monday evening and he would pick me up and then we picked up the late Eric Varley before arriving at Church where we all had difficulty getting out of the car and had to help each other! It got to be quite a joke between us. Happy memories. Michael and Mary also bought us a lovely yellow rose tree for our Golden Wedding a few years ago (yellow was his favourite colour in flowers) which blooms every year and reminds us of them. He will never be forgotten. *Roy and Georgina Cressey*

He always had time for a chat and was kind and thoughtful. For example, driving over to Sheffield late one evening to pick us up after we had overslept on the train from Glasgow or driving to Linton Youth hostel one Sunday to pick us up after we became ill. He was always willing to help out whenever he could and I was very sad to hear of his passing. *Colin Dean*

I have two abiding memories of Michael. The first one was when in a meeting he suggested we knock down the Church and build something more suitable for the modern age – quite something for one of our most senior members to advovate and an indication of how forward thinking he was. Secondly when he took the trouble to phone me and let me know that his son Richard had died suddenly. He was aware that Richard and I knew one another, and he said: 'I didn't want you to hear of his death in the prayers at Church on Sunday'. At the darkest of moments for him, he was still thinking of others. *Tracy Dick*
