Longing for Light

I'm writing this letter just before 4 o'clock and it's getting dark already! At this time of the year in the UK, we often only have 7 or 8

hours of daylight every day. Oh, how it makes me crave the long, light nights of summer.

However, this darkness pales in comparison when we acknowledge the darkness of the news: where we see and hear the ongoing war in Israel/Palestine, Ukraine and beyond; the destructiveness of climate change, the suffering of refugees on unsafe boats and camps. There is also the darkness in our lives: in the midst of illness and grief; the cost-of-living crisis.

And yet in our darkness, God will meet us there. In our darkness, God is present. A God of faith, hope and love. A God revealed in Jesus.

Two thousand years ago, Jesus was born into a world characterised by the occupation and oppression of the Roman Empire. An Empire which impacted on so many parts of a person's life and must have felt like it could last forever,

We talk about Jesus' coming into the world, as light shining in darkness. The light of Jesus reveals how darkness in our lives and world can be overcome. To quote one of the Gospel writers, John: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it".

Christmas is about Jesus Christ entering the pain and darkness of every time and place, including ours, to bring light. A light of faith, hope and love that each and every one of us, can share with our families, our communities, our world.

So, my hope and prayer is that Jesus' light can provide each and every one of us with peace and hope this Christmas.

Advent and Christmas at Colton Methodist Church



"Hush the Noise" is the Methodist Church's Christmas campaign for 2024. It's based around the Christmas Carol "It came upon the midnight clear". Christmas is loud isn't it? So much expectation. 
Action for Children

Colton Church Eco Tips – December and January

According to the Met Office which uses the meteorological calendar, the first day of winter is always on the 1st December, ending on the 28th (or 29th in a Leap year) February. The astronomical calendar sets the start of winter this year as being the 21st December, ending on the 20th March 2025. Whichever date is your preference, winter is a-coming and it's time to think about things we can do to look after ourselves, our planet and our neighbours – this month, we offer some tips for you to consider:

Greening your home

Check what more can be done to make your house more sustainable and cosy, all whilst reducing your bills.

- Identify and seal drafts around your home. Think keyholes, letterboxes, cracks around the bottom or edges of windows, loft hatches, floorboards etc. There are online tutorials to help you to fix these using the correct materials.
- Close curtains and blinds at night to keep the heat in.
- Wrap any exposed pipes with old towels or blankets to prevent heat loss.

Using grit and salt safely

At some point this season, many of us will be using salt to clear our paths of snow and ice. Few people think of salt as a polluting substance, but it is toxic and changes the natural levels in water courses and soil. To minimise its negative environmental impact whilst keeping our pathways safe, the following tips might be helpful.

- Use rock salt, mixed with grit.
- Store it carefully to prevent uncontrolled release keep it covered and contained so it can't get washed away.
- Try to spread before snow and ice and if possible, on dry ground keep an eye on the forecast. Spreading salt on top of ice means it's more likely to wash away.
- Spread as small an amount as you can get away with. You actually need a lot less than you think. About a tablespoon per metre is enough.
- Take particular care in areas around drains, gulleys, watercourses and vulnerable plants try not to pollute these areas with too much salt.

RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 2025

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) has set the date of the annual Big Garden Birdwatch 2025 for the weekend of the 24th – 26th January.



It couldn't be easier to get involved – just register on the RSPB website (rspb.org.uk) from

mid-December and take part in the world's largest garden wildlife survey in January.

Choose on which date you'd like to do your survey between the 24th – 26th January, then sit back and spend an hour watching the birds in your garden, from a balcony, in your local park, or in the Church grounds for example. Then tell the RSPB what you've seen. Even if you see very few birds or none at all, that's still important information to share. But you never know what species you might see!

The top five species spotted in January 2024 were:

- House Sparrow
- 2. Blue Tit
- Starling
- 4. Woodpigeon
- Blackbird

NB. You can help birds and other animal too, by putting fresh clean water out regularly for them. You might need to break the ice when it gets very cold and stay safe yourself too - don't slip! A wide, safe and shallow puddle or dish with a rock or two to perch on would be a kindness to a bird. (Search for 'Make the perfect bird bath' on the RSPB website.) Have a safe and warm winter and Happy Bird Watching!
