'I don't know where prayers go, or what they do.
Do cats pray, while they sleep half-asleep in the sun?
Does the opossum pray as it crosses the street?
The sunflowers? The old black oak Growing older every year?

Recently, in one of the churches that I minister to, it was a privilege to be part of choosing and presenting books to each of the young people in the Junior Church. It's the second year of trying to resurrect a yearly tradition of gift-giving, a presentation day for the young people of the Church, and this year, the theme for the books we chose was 'prayer'.

The books all had really appealing names, like 'The Prayer Experiment', 'The Prayer Map for Teens', and 'What every Child Should Know About Prayer'. Each had been researched and considered, then matched with each child according to their age, stage and nature, and it was an absolute joy to present them.

But as I enjoyed the books being presented to each of the children, with the love and prayers of the Church, I couldn't help but reflect in the moment that probably every one of the people there would love some more guidance on what prayer is all about!

The words at the top of the page are taken from a poem by Mary Oliver called 'I Happened to be Standing', in which she puts into words some of the confused thoughts that many of us perhaps have about what prayer might be. It's not a straightforward subject!

The questions asked in Oliver's poem might seem strange, but I encourage you to read them again once or twice. They don't necessarily become less strange in the re-reading, but I think the more I ponder these questions I'm more drawn into the brilliant way they open up the scale and depth of the mystery that surrounds prayer.

Perhaps we know that prayer is about speaking to God, and we know it's important (because we've been told it is, and that we should do it every day), but as to where our prayers go and what happens after we've uttered them, there are mysteries on mysteries and little chance we can ever understand this side of glory!

For what it's worth, I know that I can't fully understand prayer, but I feel so privileged that God invites me to speak and ask for things, that I know that I want to pray, even though I don't make enough time for the many different prayers I'd like to pray! I want to pray like a cat half-asleep in the sun, where from my contentedness I utter gratitude for the smallest of happy moments. I want to pray like the opossum crossing the street, trusting in God to hear my worries and uncertainties, and to accompany at times of fear. I want to pray like a sunflower, turning always to the light of God, and like an oak that is growing old, wondering if the world can ever change for the better, bringing my deep and desperate longing for a world at peace to one far more immovable than I am.

Our uncertainties about prayer can make us unwilling to engage with it, I think.

This season, as the wonders of autumn fall, I invite you to consider the mysteries of the world, of God, and of prayer, and to allow gratitude to exude from you, worries to be uttered under your breath, and concerns for the world laid heavily down as you turn to God throughout the changing days, and know that, if nothing else about it makes sense, God is listening to you. *Rev Becki*

## Building Something New - An Update on Building Projects at Cross Gates Methodist Church

As you will know, we've been looking at some changes to the building here at Cross Gates Methodist Church, and we've been truly delighted by the financial support and enthusiasm that has been behind this work so far. I thought it would be a useful moment to summarise this work, so that there is clarity for everyone, and reason to get more excited too! The Cellar: The cellar at Cross Gates, under the main church building, is absolutely huge, and hasn't been used for anything more than storage for some time. We are currently gathering funds to renovate the cellar space, with the intention of it being used for youth work. The youth work would be done by Missional Generation, a Christian youthwork organisation which currently operates out of one of our upstairs office spaces, and they would move into the cellar once it has been renovated to become part office and part drop-in area. This would mean that not only could Missional Generation run their administration and management from the centre of Cross Gates, but youth work could be actively happening in the building too. The project is not a huge one, but requires funds we currently don't have, and so we are acquiring grant funding alongside the generous gifts of those who have donated and will proceed with the work as soon as we can.

**Longer Term:** One of the realities that faces the current congregation and Church Council of Cross Gates Methodist is that the building we worship in is vast, underused, and ageing. Without some very large scale changes, there is simply no way that we can expect to keep this building for many more years. As such, permission has been granted by the Circuit Meeting for us to explore a project, by applying for grants and help with feasibility studies, to include architectural feasibility of a range of possibilities, and community audit work to clarify what purposes for a reordered building would best serve Cross Gates. This project will likely encompass every bit of the church building from floor to ceiling, probably including putting in at least another floor, and radically redrawing the inside to provide spaces that make a difference in our amazing location. Reasonably, we would keep a place to worship as a non-negotiable element in whatever the eventual design will be, and I look forward to seeing how a reimagined space would lead to better uses for both the church and community, and I'm sure it would bring with it a re-invigorated sense of what church is called to be and do. This is not a short-term sort of project, so your ongoing prayers and support will be most welcome indeed.

In particular please pray for:

- 1) A newly established Missional Property Group who will lead the conversation and planning of this project
- 2) For the funding for feasibility studies to come quickly so the plan doesn't stagnate
- For God to demonstrate to us, through prayer and conversation, the best ways to be present to the Cross Gates community of the decades ahead.

## Making A Will

We spend our lives working to provide for ourselves and our loved ones. So it is good practice to have an up to date Will whatever your personal circumstances. Making your Will means you can be certain that your wishes are followed after your death.

Making a Will is often seen as a very sensitive subject, one which many people prefer to put off until a later date. However, having a Will can make life much easier for our loved ones when the time comes. A Will is the only way to make sure money, property and possessions go to the people and causes we care about.

After you have provided for family and loved ones giving even relatively small amounts to charities and other causes such as our Church can make a real difference. Our Church has been remembered in the Wills of several members over the years and their generous contributions have helped our finances considerably.

#### <u>Cross Gates Wesleyan Institute World War 1</u> <u>Memorial Plaque – Christine Holdstock</u>

In addition to the World War One Memorial in the Church (I wrote about the men named on this memorial in 2021 newsletters), there is another memorial in the cellar, which will be soon moved up to the Church. In 1907-8 the Church premises were considerably enlarged by the addition of the Chancel, Transept, Lecture Hall and Institute, increasing the seated accommodation to 652. The Institute was a place for young men to meet, play snooker and read. When war broke out upwards of one hundred members of the Institute joined His Majesty's forces. The Institute remained open during the War; members who had answered their country's call met there when on furlough. It was enlarged after the

end of the war to provide better facilities for returned soldiers.

This Oak Memorial to the 13 members who had fallen during the war, was placed on the wall of the Institute at that time.

The re-opening of the Institute and unveiling of the Memorial Tablet took place on 11<sup>th</sup> October 1919.

Of the 13 men whose names are on the memorial, seven are also on the memorial in Church and you can read about them in the September-December 2021 newsletters. When I saw the Institute Memorial I decided to try to find out more about the other six men named there.
